





* MOST LIKELY TO SPACE OUT Paul Allen and aerospace engineer Burt Rutan of Scaled Composites made history in 2004 with SpaceShipOne (scaled.com)—the first privately constructed manned spacecraft to successfully enter suborbital space. * CLASS BRAIN Founded in 2003, the Allen Institute for Brain Science (alleninstitute. org) is responsible for endeavors like the Allen Brain Atlas project, completed in 2006, and the first-ever summit for brain sciences. * BEST SCIENCE FAIR PROJECT Funded and managed by Allen's Vulcan Inc., Project Halo (projecthalo.com) is a research effort to develop a problem-solving artificial intelligence, currently dubbed "Digital Aristotle," with the goal of creating an artificial tutor and/ or scientific assistant with the ability to consider and answer novel questions. * MOST DEDICATED HOBBYIST In 2000 and 2004, Paul Allen opened the Experience Music Project and the Science Fiction Museum (empsfm.org), permanently conjoining two of his hobbies

inside one very colorful, very misshapen building. * BEST COMPUTER TUTOR What started in 2006 as a digital documentation
of ages-old computers has evolved into an impressive timeline of
computer technology called the Living Computer Museum, which
boasts a working VAX-11 (livingcomputermuseum.org; not yet open to
the public). * BIGGEST MODEL AIRPLANE COLLECTION In 1998,
Allen began acquiring World War II-era aircraft, which he renovated
and put on display in 2004 as the Flying Heritage Collection (flyingheritage.com) at Paine Field in Everett. * FIRST PLACE AT BATTLE
OF THE BANDS What kind of multitalented software developer and
noted philanthropist would Allen be without a short-lived musical career
on his résumé? From 1996 to 1999, Allen played guitar and wrote lyrics
for Grown Men (grownmen.com), a rock group that performed original
material. Sadly, the band's single self-titled album cannot be found on
iTunes or Amazon-perhaps there's a copy in storage at the EMP?



What better way to spend a rainy day than with a game? Perhaps it's not surprising that Seattle is home to an abundance of game companies-from console to video to online to good old board games-and gaming stores where you are encouraged to get your geek on, rain or shine. BY CAYLA LAMBIER



PREMIER PLATFORMS

MICROSOFT: ONLY KINECT

Say what you will about Windows, the Zune, Bing and other much maligned Microsoft products. The Redmond-based behemoth has kicked some major butt in the gaming world. It 2001 it entered the console gaming arena with the Xbox and, in 2005, cemented its position with the XBOX 360. Aside from sharp graphics and smooth gameplay, the 360 advanced the idea of an online marketplace and gamer achievements, and sold more than 40 million units since its debut. Last November. Microsoft blurred the line between game and gamer with the Kinect, a sophisticated set of cameras and microphones that literally turn the player into the controller. If only they could make Microsoft Word so seamless.

NINTENDO OF AMERICA: WHEEE!

Based in Redmond since 1982, Nintendo of America has been at the forefront of every gaming generation leap, and has dominated the AV ports of televisions since its 1985 release of the Nintendo Entertainment System (NES). (Last fall marked the 25th anniversary of beloved goomba-stomping plumbers, the Super Mario Bros.) In 1996, the N64 brought video games out of flat graphics into the colorful 3-D world and, in 2001, upgraded us from cartridges to discs with the GameCube. In 2006. Nintendo released THE WIL which pioneered motion gaming and brought computer gameplay to entire families-the unfortunate side effect being the braggadocio of high-score moms.

>>> Redmond resident Steve Wiebe was the first person to achieve more than 1 million points in the original Donkey Kong arcade game (his battle to stay on top was the focus of the 2007 documentary The King of Kong: A Fistful of Quarters). In 2010, Wiebe regained the Donkey Kong champion title by scoring 1,064,500 points. »John McAllister, a Seattle locksmith, broke the Asteroids high score last spring during a 58-hour playing spree with 41,338,740 points!



VIDEO GAME DEVELOPERS

BUNGIE

BACKGROUND: After moving from Chicago to Redmond in 2001. Bungie released HALO: COMBAT EVOLVED, a game that would change first-person shooter (FPS) games forever.

KNOWN FOR: HALO, HALO 2, HALO 3 and HALO REACH (FPS; PC/Xbox/360) introduced multiplayer gamers to the hyper-pious alien collective known as The Covenant and the nightmare-inducing alien parasite known as The

WHAT'S NEW: Bungie officially confirmed in multiple interviews that Halo Reach was the last installment of the Halo series and that the company would be turning its attention toward a new project. bungie.net

VALVE

BACKGROUND: Founded in Bellevue in 1996, Valve specializes in complex games with detailed plots and cutting-edge physics. In 2007, Valve released Steam, a hugely successful online gaming platform that manages more than 1,100 games.

KNOWN FOR: THE ORANGE BOX (PC/360), arguably the holy trinity of gameplay, which includes Valve's critically acclaimed HALF-LIFE 2 (FPS), the wildly successful PORTAL (FPS/Puzzle) and the fast-paced, team-oriented TEAM FORTRESS 2 (FPS).

WHAT'S NEW: Scheduled for release this year, Portal 2 will serve up all new physics-defying shenanigans. valvesoftware.com/games

POPCAP

BACKGROUND: In 2000, Belltown-based Popcap set out to develop games that were instantly addictive-and succeeded with Bejeweled.

Since then, Popcap has won more than 100 awards and developed more than 50 games.

KNOWN FOR: BEJEWELED, BEJEWELED 2 and BEJEWELED 3 (PC/mobile), all puzzles of the "Match 3" variety (match three gems of the same type to clear the screen). Bejeweled is the only puzzle game other than Tetris to be inducted into the Computer Gaming World Hall of Fame.

WHAT'S NEW: Bejeweled 3, released in December, features HD visuals and fluid gameplay. popcap.com


founded 2000) Privateer found success with its steampunkthemed tabletop game WARMACHINE, in which players side with factions, such as the technologically advanced Cygnar or the imperialistic Khador, and build armies. Detailed plastic and metal miniatures are often hand-painted by serious players. Companion game HORDES focuses on the "savage" factions of the world. privateerpress.com

[NERD LITE] SCREENLIFE (Seattle, founded 2001) In 2002, Screenlife took the "board" out of board game with **SCENE-IT?**, a trivia game played via DVD. Also available for video game consoles and mobile phones, Scene-It? tests knowledge of film, television and pop culture. Since its debut, nearly 20 million copies of the game have been sold worldwide. screenlifegames.com ¶ CRANIUM INC. (Seattle, founded 1998;) Developed by former Microsoft employees, the elaborate board game CRANIUM was an instant success, requiring players to use talents from singing, drawing and sculpting to pantomiming, spelling and spouting trivia. Hasbro acquired the company in 2008 and shuttered the Seattle office a year later. Game over. hasbro.com/games/cranium



Double nerd points go to the SEATTLE PUBLIC LIBRARY for erecting a downtown pleasure dome dedicated to the pursuit of reading, as well as upgrading neighborhood libraries to pass ecological muster. Our citizenry passed the "Libraries for All" bond measure with a whopping 72 percent approval in 1998, and that resulted in the creation of downtown's Crystal Palace as well as the renovation of many local libraries, including the Ballard branch, which boasts solar panels and a "green roof" to aid insulation and reduce runoff. Seattle's reading population continues to vote with its feet and mouse fingers: According to the most recent poll (2009), pocket-protected patrons visited the library system or used its online resources more than 14 million times.


Seattle-Geekly.com: If you're wondering where to find out about hot, superhero-themed costume parties, game nights and zombie conventions that might have escaped your radar, or hoping to read a review of the Battlestar Galactica: The Exhibition show at the EMP/SFM (on view through 3/4/2012), your search is over. Seattle-Geekly.com offers regular updates on all things local and geeky (including a helpful Geek Week calendar, so you can pace yourself). According to co-creator Matt Hammond, the clearinghouse gets about 5,000 unique visits per month. "For those of us that grew up pre-Internet, it was easy to feel isolated and was often difficult to find a community of geeks outside your immediate circle of friends," says Hammond. "We try to provide a connection to the larger geek community through the podcast, website and social media."








JIM WOODRING

ED BRUBAKER

One of the biggest and best writers of comics, Seattle-based Brubaker has amassed three Eisner Awards—the Oscars of the comics world—for best writer, and another for the best single issue ("Captain America," No. 601). Brubaker's run on the latter is notable for a) killing off Cap, b) resurrecting him and c) turning a cheesy title into a kick-ass espionage story. In addition to "Daredevil," "Uncanny X-Men" and others, the crime buff's noir comic "Criminal" is not to be missed, and his "Incognito" (about a supervillain in a witness-protection program) is in development as a feature film. edbrubaker.com





If you're too busy to go outside and see for yourself, check out Seattle RainWatch (atmos. washington.edu/SPU), the brainchild of UW meteorologist and locally worshipped weather guru Cliff Mass (cliffmass. blogspot.com), who proposed the "now-casting" system to give a neighborhoodby-neighborhood view of real-time precipitation. Puget Sound precipitation levels are tracked in one-, six-, 12-, 24- and 48-hour intervals, and forecasts are updated by the hour. Still not enough weather data? You can also hit refresh on the "Instant Precip" page as often as you need to.

X DID YOU KNOW?

Bill Nye the Science Guy, who first gained fame as the mad experimenter on the local sketch comedy show Almost Live!, didn't just play an inventor on TV. He has earned U.S. patents—for a magnifying glass made with water and an abacus that works like a computer—and is developing an improved toe shoe for ballerinas.



The space race is back! And this time it's personal. Apparently, everyone wants to leave the Earth, especially our abundant cadre of local tycoons.

- Charles Lindbergh won a whopping \$25,000 prize for his transatlantic flight in 1927. Now the goal is civilian space travel and the prize has grown to \$10 million, thanks to the Ansari X Prize, which was won by local rocket fanboy Paul Allen and his SpaceShipOne team.
- Not to be outdone is Amazon.com CEO Jeff Bezos, whose company **Blue Origin** is using its \$3.7 million stimulus package award to develop a system for manned space flight. While Amazon was launched in Seattle, Bezos' current launch pad has moved to west Texas, where vertical take-offs and landings do not draw as much attention from air traffic control.
- Seattle's own **LaserMotive** recently won \$900,000 in a contest at the NASA-sponsored 2009 Space Elevator Games. LaserMotive aims to prove the feasibility of using powerbeaming systems for launching satellites and other objects into orbit above the Earth. A warning to free-agent Seattle Mariners: You could become one of those "other objects."
- Back here on Earth, astronaut Bonnie Dunbar and the Museum of Flight have launched a fundraising campaign to bring one of the retired space shuttles to its aerospace station in South Seattle. (To donate, visit museumofflight.org.)
